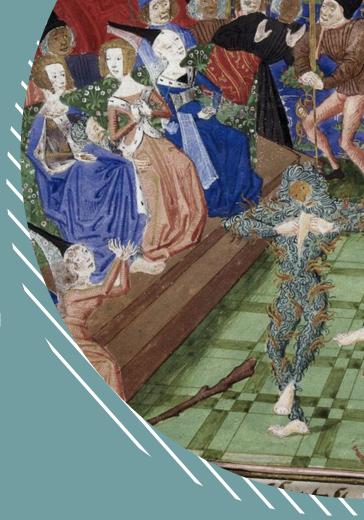

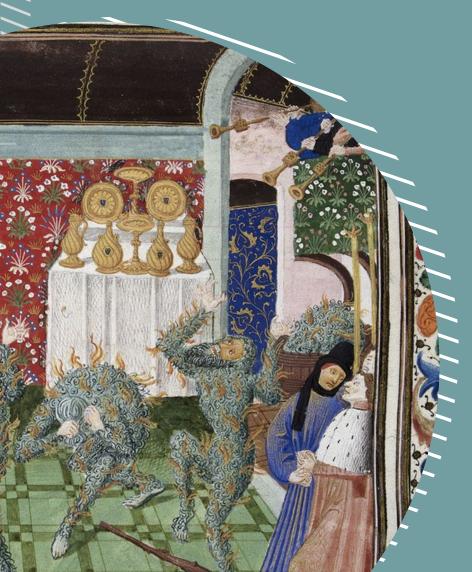
END OF CONFERENCE
