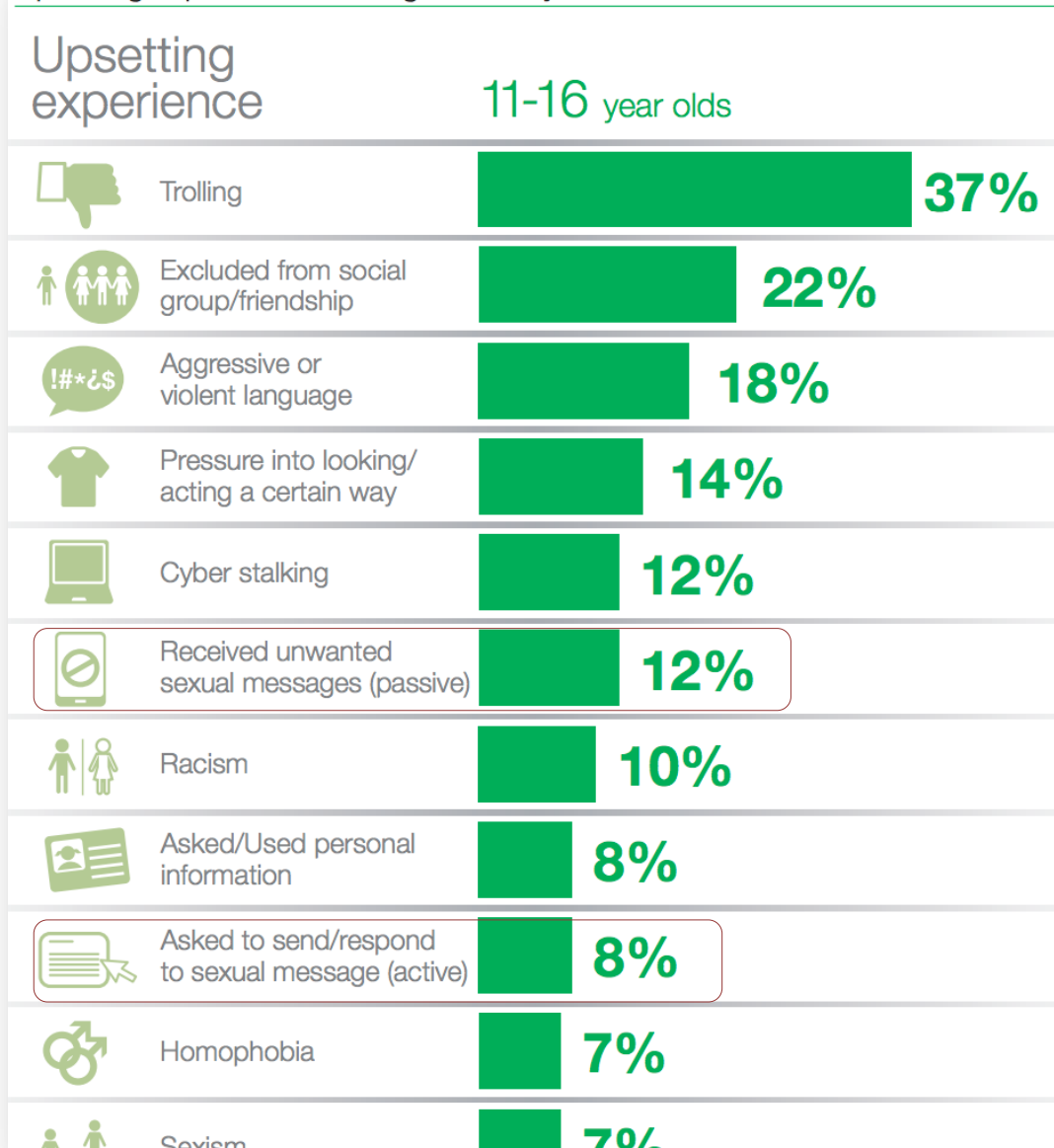
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CHILD GROOMING

Premeditated behaviour intending to secure the trust of a minor as a first step towards future engagement in sexual conduct.



Upsetting experiences amongst 11-16 year olds¹²



“findings show that approximately 190,000 UK children (1 in 58) will suffer contact sexual abuse by a non-related adult before turning 18, with approximately 10,000 new child victims of contact sexual abuse being reported in the UK each year.”

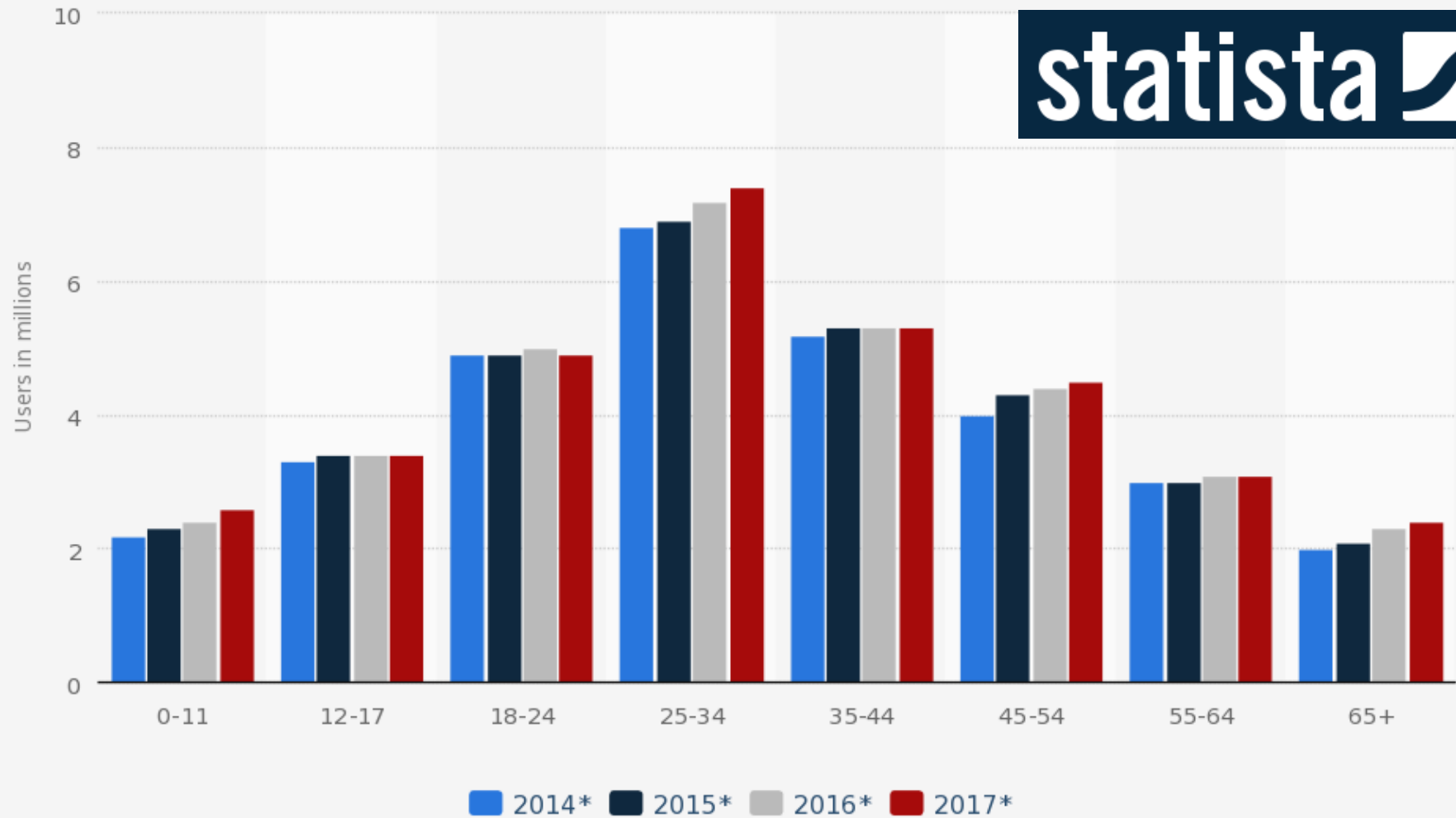

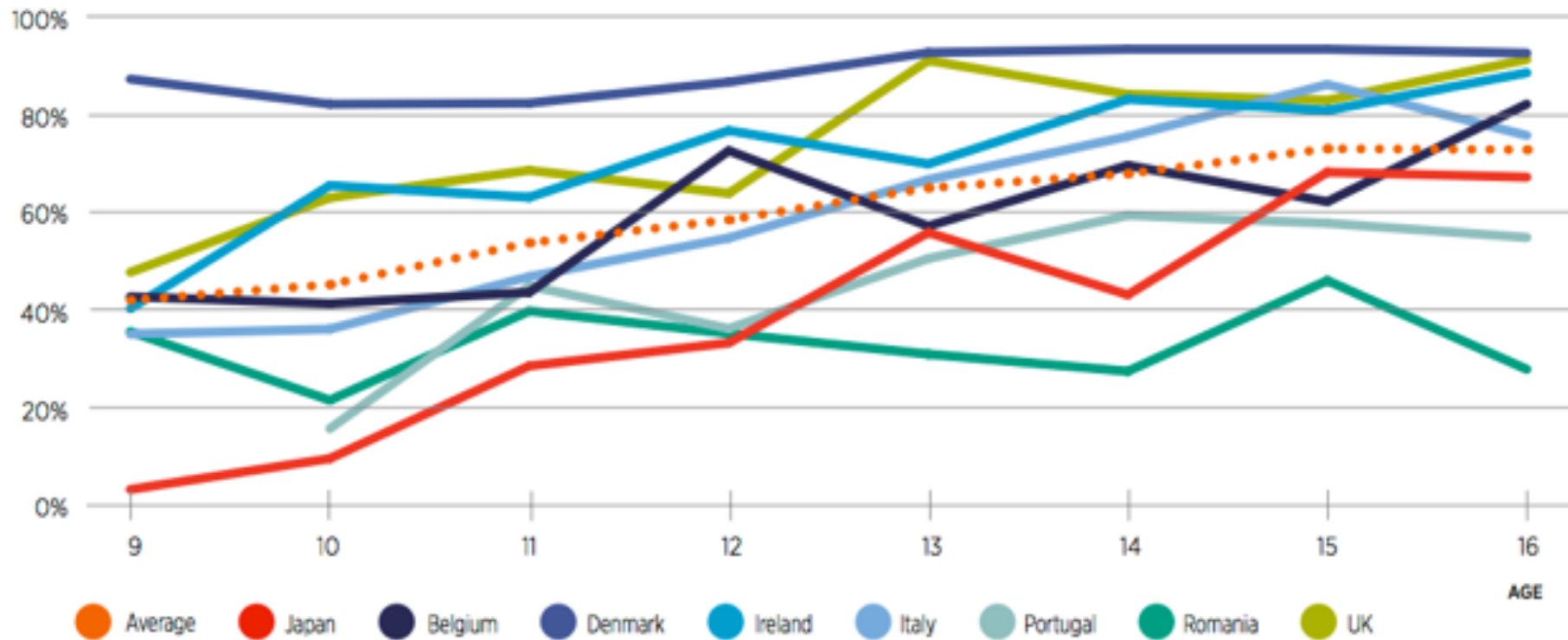
Number of Facebook users in the United Kingdom (UK) from 2014 to 2017, by age group (in million users)

ONLINE GROOMING

How does grooming work online?

Grooming is about building a relationship with a child in order to later abuse them. This can be far easier online.

- ❑ Games, social media and chatrooms enable people to make contact with children to try to groom them.
- ❑ They can create multiple online identities and even pretend to be children and young people to trick real children into chatting and sharing.
- ❑ They can find out a lot about individual children before they make contact by looking at the things the child has posted.
- ❑ Using this information they can target children who are particularly vulnerable and carefully plan what they will say and show an interest in.
- ❑ They can also contact lots of children very quickly in the hope that one will respond



SIGNS OF ONLINE GROOMING

○ Too good to be true?

Do they share all of your interests and give you lots of attention? Are things moving pretty fast? We all like attention, but remember abusers will do everything to get your attention. If you are asked to do anything you're not comfortable with, please contact us at [CEOP](#).

○ Flattery.

Do they praise pictures on your profile, saying you feel good about yourself or special. It's harder to be especially careful.

○ Let's talk about sex.

They will try to get young people to talk about sex online. They are often shy online than in real life so talking about sex online is easier. They may be flirty or tries to get you to talk about sex online. Remember – it is against the law and whatever they say, sex between adults and children is illegal.

○ Got any sexy pictures?

They might ask for sexy pictures and tell you that they're asking you for indecent pictures they are not comfortable with. Remember – it is against the law and whatever they say, sex between adults and children is illegal. [Find out more](#)

○ Can we go somewhere more private?

Did you meet in a public place like a game or a chatroom? Have they asked to add you on Facebook, BBM, Whatsapp or anything which allows private chat? Private chat makes it easier to start a relationship and build trust with you. Think before adding people to your networks – do they need to private message you or can you keep chatting in a more public place?

○ Our little secret?

Abusers don't want other people to know they're chatting to you - because other people, family or friends, may be able to help if things go wrong. They might ask you to keep your chat a secret or say you'll be in trouble if anyone else find out. If someone is making you do things you don't want to do or aren't comfortable with you shouldn't keep it a secret. Tell an adult you trust, phone ChildLine or contact us at [CEOP](#)

○ Mood swings

People who abuse try to control young people by flattering them and giving lots of attention. If young people don't do what they want - they take that away or suddenly become very nasty. You don't have to do anything you're not comfortable with.

○ My webcam's broken.

Some abusers pretend to be a boy or a girl around your age and claim their webcam is broken so you can't see them. Never webcam with a stranger with a broken webcam. Remember – it's easy to record and fake a webcam feed. Just because you think you've seen someone on webcam doesn't mean it's really them!

Predator: yeah, there's nothing wrong with us being friends, we have the same lord remember ;)

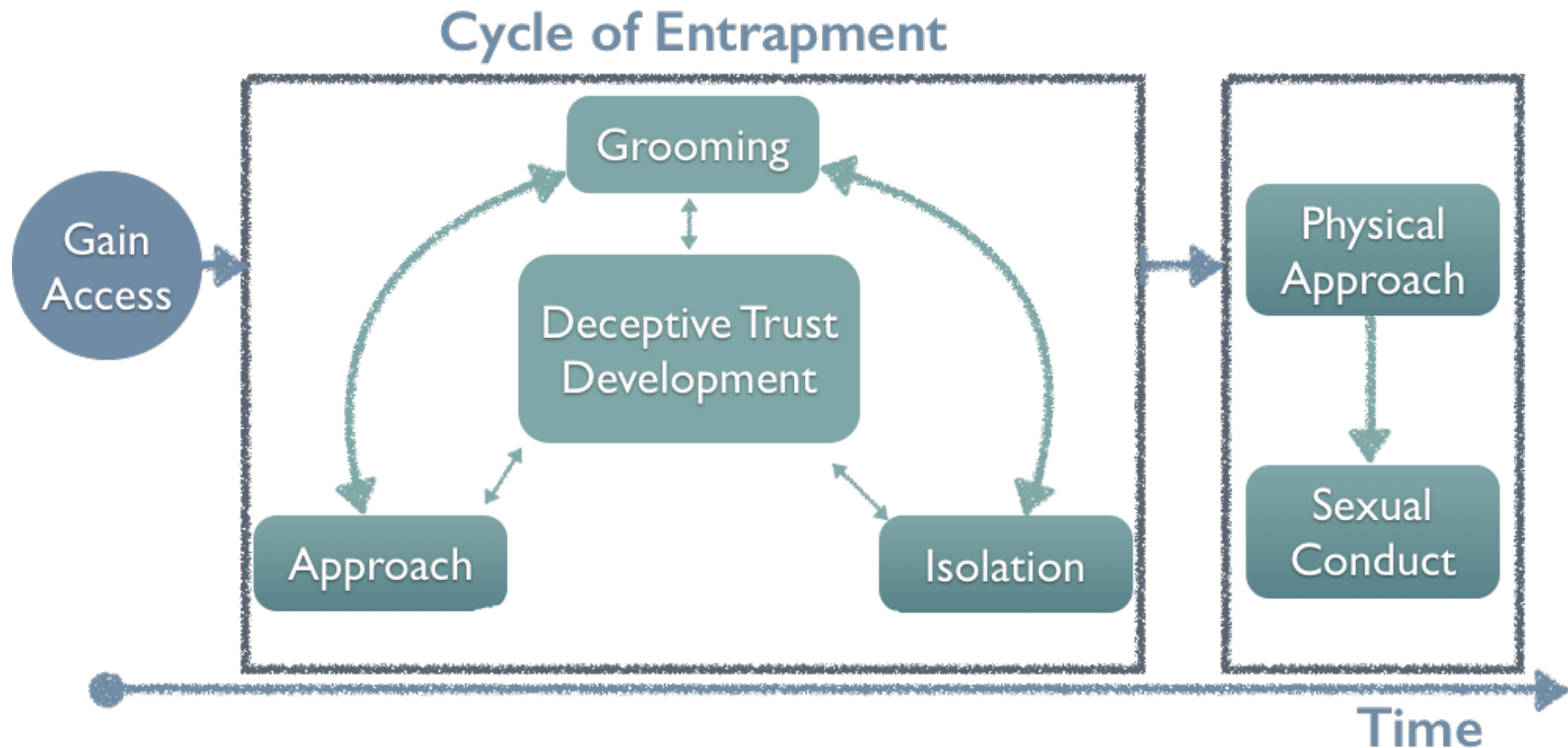

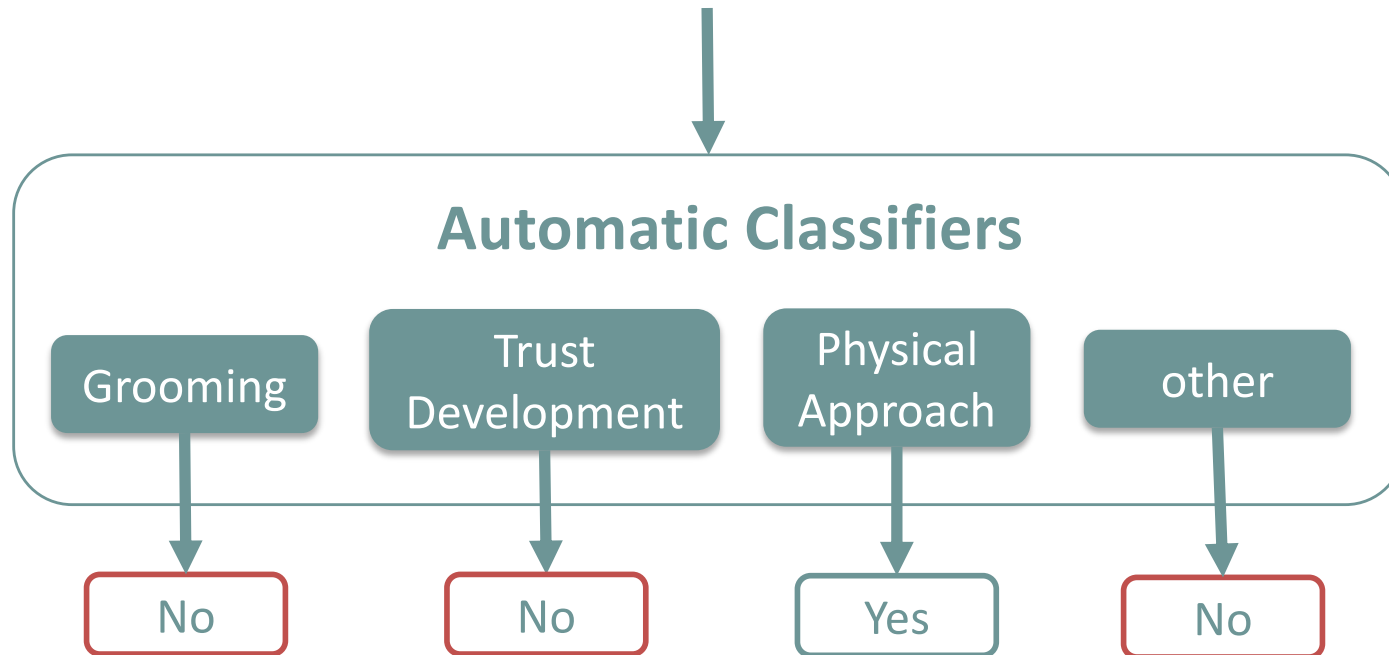

DATASET

- 50 transcripts of conversations between convicted predators and volunteers who posed as minors
- Conversations vary between 83 to 12K lines.
- Each predator line manually labelled by two annotators.
- Annotations labels: 1) Trust development, 2) Grooming, 3) Seek physical approach, 4) Other.

PROCESSING CHAT TEXT

- **Challenges in processing chat-room conversations**
 - Use of irregular and ill-formed words.
 - Use of chat slang and teen-lingo
 - Use of emoticons.

Generated a list of over 1K terms and definitions:

Chat term	Translation	Emoticon	Translation
ASLP	Age, sex, location, picture	:’-(I’m crying
AWGTHHTTA	Are we going to have to go through this again?	o/\o	High five
BRB	Be right back	@_@	I’m tired, trying to stay awake
CWOT	Complete waste of time	(‘}’)	kiss

ANALYSIS FEATURES & RESULTS

Feature	Description
N-gram	word combinations extracted from text (N=1,2,3)
Part-of-speech tagging	noun, verb, adjective, plural, etc.
sentiment	average sentiment of terms in sentence
length	number of words in sentence
Psycho-linguistic Patterns	62 psycho-linguistic patterns in English (swearing, sexual, agreement, etc.)
Semantic frames	Type of event, relation, or entity in text, e.g., secrecy, desirability, emotion, kinship

Results - with all features:

Precision	79.2%	87.6%	87.2%	84.7%
Recall	82.3%	88.8%	88.7%	86.6%
F1	80.7%	88.2%	87.9%	85.6%
