# Mozambique political process bulletin



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# High turnout over 2/3 in some places and below 1/3 in others

Turnout in local elections ranged from 29% in Malema up to 70% in Nhamayabue. Chibuto, Manjacaze, and Dondo had participation over 67%. (Tables in the attached pdf give high and low turnouts.)

Maputo had a participation of 50.3%, slightly up on the 46.6% of 2008. Turnout in Matola was 38%, compared to 40% five years ago. In Beira, 58% of registered voters cast their ballots, compared to 56% in the previous municipal election.

### **Questions about Marromeu and Dondo**

Final results raise questions about tampering with the ballots in Marromeu and Dondo. Normally in cities, fewer than 3% of ballot papers are declared invalid (nulo) at the polling station, and usually 10% to 15% of those are accepted as valid in Maputo.

Marromeu is very unusual in that 13% of votes were called invalid at the polling station and fewer than 1% were changed in Maputo. That is highly suggestive of ballot tampering, particularly of polling station staff illegally invalidating ballot papers for the opposition by adding a second mark for another candidate. And in watching the requalification of ballots for other polling stations, the *Bulletin* did see examples of an ink line drawn across ballot papers.

Dondo, where staff were caught ballot box stuffing in the first local elections in 1998, had one of the highest turnouts and the second highest rate of invalid ballot papers, of over 7%. Both must be seen as suspicious.

In Beira, the issue was the opposite. There were 5% of ballot papers ruled invalid – high but not impossible – but of those, 20% were considered valid in Maputo.

## **CNE** makes unexplained changes in three cities

The results released by the CNE have unexplained changes for three cities, Angoche, Ribaué and Beira. In Angoche the number of votes for the winning Frelimo candidate for mayor was increased by 18% compared to results announced by the district election commission, while in Beira the result for MDM mayoral candidate was increased by 4% - more than 3000 votes. And in Ribaué the Frelimo presidential candidate lost 7% of their votes. The CNE has given no explanation for the changes.
